We took the group on many trips: to Camp Cazadero, Santa Cruz, New Brighton Beach, Soda Springs' snow, and San Francisco. We had swim parties at Bill Reiff's ranch. The Frankes, Matsons, Fischers were always there to help.

Lawrence and I traveled together in the 1970's and 1980's to many countries: Europe, Scandinavia, Australia and New Zealand, and took many cruises, too. We both liked to travel. Besides traveling, we liked to folk dance and to ballroom dance.

In 1960 – 1961 we built our home where I still live.

Our son James married in 1971 and gave us three beautiful grandchildren: Tara, Traci, and Leland; 8 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. It has been so exciting to have five generations for this time- August 2013-2018. We also had five generations when Lawrence and his mother were still alive in 1992-1993.

It was so difficult when I lost Lawrence in May of 1993 after a two year battle with cancer, but it seemed there were many of us who lost our spouses. The church really became my second family with the support of Dr. Sill and Pastor Bill Schroeder and our meetings with the other members.

Thanks to my mother-in-law, Wilhemine - she gave me her recipe for Pomegranate Jelly. I have lost count of how many Fairs I have made jelly for over the years. I became known as the Jelly Lady.

In Summer of 1948 I drove Bulk Truck in the barley harvest and Lawrence was separator man on the harvester. The last day of harvest he asked me for a date to go to San Francisco. On January 29, 1949 we were married in St. John's Evangelical and Reformed Church by Rev. Robert Nienkamp. Lawrence said he waited for the farmer's daughter to grow up.

On June 1949 I joined the church and Lawrence, his mother, Wilhemine, and his sister, Hazel Peterson, transferred from Esparto Community Church.

Lawrence continued to work for my Dad until 1953. He worked for the U.S. Post Office for eleven years, then Cranston International until he retired in 1985.

My first job was for District Attorney Les Means in the old Court House from February 1949 – 1950. Back then you could not work if you were pregnant.

November 9, 1950 our son James was born. I was a stay at home mom until 1957, then went to work at The Daily Democrat through 1985.

Lawrence and I were both active in the church. Lawrence was Treasurer for seven years, I was on the Trustees Board for ten years. We also were sponsors for the Pilgrim Fellowship Youth group. Dale Hampen was youth minister 1967—1968 – lots of fun.

TRUSTEES- Security Updates

In March security cameras were installed off the preschool building and social hall to view the parking lot, courtyard, play yard and north side of our preschool building.

The trustees approved adding two additional cameras off of the church office to view activity from the sidewalk to and from the sanctuary. These cameras were installed in April.

At night the cameras are showing a lot of individuals and cats walking through our facilities to take a short cut to get from the street to the parking lot. In order to stop individuals from walking through our facilities we will be replacing the wooden gate between the preschool and sanctuary with an open metal gate and adding a second gate between the church office entrance to the sanctuary. Both gates will be locked at night.

We will also be adding an additional outside light on the NW corner of the office and brighter LED light by the North office door.

Dolores Neilson



I was born June 29, 1929, at home, in a big two-story ranch house on Rd. 19, 12 miles west of Woodland. I was named Dolores May Hayes.

I always felt blessed to be raised on a farm by my loving parents, Leland and Florence Hayes, and having an older brother, Darrel, who was very protective. We went to a one room school one mile from our home (Clover) with all grades – one teacher for 14 students. Then we went to Esparto High School -125 students total - and I graduated in 1947. Then I went to Heald's Business College in Sacramento for 1 year.

I first knew Lawrence Neilson when I was 7 and he was 14. Each summer he would work on the ranch for Dad. World War II came, and he was drafted in 1943. Lawrence served until December 1945. He was in Germany and France – First Army Engineers 254th Combat—serving at Normandy on D-day, and at the Battle of the Bulge.
